On 2 January 2000, Ullin Thomas (U.T.) Place passed away after battling cancer for over one year. The philosophical and scientific community will remember and remain indebted to him for one of the earliest formulations of the “consciousness-brain identity hypothesis” in the contemporary period. Charles (C.B.) Martin’s Foreword to Ullin’s essay published here recalls poignantly Ullin’s initial work formulating that hypothesis and the arguments for it that justly made him famous. Those of us lucky enough to have known Ullin personally will remember him for his charming company. A memory that I will always savor was lunch with Ullin in Memphis, June 1994, at the Society for Philosophy and Psychology meetings, where he recounted for me the personal side of the development of “Australian materialism”.

To better honor Ullin’s later work, his memory, and the mark he left on philosophy of mind, *Brain and Mind* will publish his “On the causal potency of qualia: Its nature and source” in a later issue of Volume 1. Professor George Graham (University of Alabama, Birmingham), a close friend of Ullin’s, will oversee this project.
