PREFACE TO THE PAPERBACK EDITION

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A number of insightful comments and criticisms have been put to me on the metaphysic I propose in *Dispositions*. I have made no significant alterations for this edition nor have I attempted to reply to my critics. I am happy that the book has stimulated discussion in its current form, so I leave it alone and hope that it continues to do so. I will, though, say a few words on developments since 1998.

Shortly after the book's completion, I became aware of a seemingly different characterization of dispositions to mine: the theory of physical intentionality championed by Ullin Place. I discussed and dismissed Place's theory in 'Intentionality and the Physical' (Philosophical Quarterly, 49 (1999)). Place died not long after, as did the other chief proponent in the theory, George Molnar. Molnar left a manuscript that became the book Powers (Oxford, 2003). I consider this to be the strongest statement yet of the theory. It has been put to me, however, that the functionalism I propose (Ch. 9) might be consistent with a form of physical intentionality similar to Molnar's. I leave it open whether the two accounts really are at odds.

Wolfgang Malzkorn (Philosophical Quarterly, 50 (2001)) has offered a defence of the conditional analysis that I had attacked (Ch. 3). He attempted to show that a refined conditional analysis avoids the existing objections. Despite this, I still think the conditional analysis should be spurned. I give my reasons in my reply to Malzkorn (Philosophical Quarterly, 51 (2001)).

There are two issues about which I am less happy. One is the notion of ungrounded dispositions (7.10), which I intend to reconsider in a paper called 'Filled in Space'. The second is the account of laws (Ch. 10). A better case has now been made for the necessity of some laws of nature, in particular by Alexander Bird (Analysis, 2001 and 2002), Brian Ellis (Scientific Essentialism, 2001), and Eugenio Lombardo (Australasian Journal of Philosophy, 2002). I hope to develop my account more satisfactorily in a future book, Laws in Nature.

In addition to those named above, and in my original preface, I have had some stimulating exchanges with David Armstrong, Ludger Jansen, and Claudine Tiercelin. The latter two also pointed out some typographical corrections.
